Staying Connected: Seeing Christ

This week we endeavor to see Christ anew like Bartimeus did. He was led by the Spirit of God and the Bible says, "As many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God" (Romans 8:14). What can we do on a regular basis to "see Jesus"? I would suggest at least three things: meditation on Scripture in the secret place (not emptying the mind but filling it), being a part of a small group that encourages each other and taking time to digest what God has revealed to us when we gather together corporately. There are other items but for the next few weeks we will focus on these. So, let's begin with how to work on Scripture meditation. This is really a form of thinking deeply on what God has already revealed to us in the past. In a way, it is like gathering principles from a story/text and personalizing it to our situation. For example, here are some steps that we can take to personalize the story of Bartimeus:

- 1. Begin with **praise to God**: we enter His courts with praise. Choose an attribute and tell Him how grateful you are for that revelation of Himself. From praise, pray asking God to guide as you read.
- 2. **Read the text** / passage / chapter (sometimes you need the whole context to get the main meaning). For now, read **Mark 10:46-52**.
- 3. In a journal or on a notepad **answer these questions**:
 - a. What is the text saying to me?
 - b. How does this text intersect with my life?
 - c. What is the invitation?
- 4. Leave plenty of space to write, draw, etc. as you read. Other texts may come to mind or thoughts that God wants you to hear. I usually **end my time with gratitude**. Next week: more suggestions.

Examples of Abuse—Protecting the Vulnerable Amongst Us

Child abuse: "verbal, physical, emotional or sexual abuse of a preschooler, child, youth, minor" ("Child Abuse Prevention/Response Handbook" online at www.nccsda.com). What are some examples of this behavior and ways of prevention? We will begin with a brief look at physical indicators of abuse. Please note, though we are not to become pre-occupied with inspecting children, there should be some awareness when we are around them. Such an awareness really helps us serve the child better while they are with us and could, in some instances, necessitate providing help in the form of notifying authorities. Looking out for a child's well-being should be our motive when approaching this subject. Quoting the handbook: "They type and location of an injury can help to distinguish accidental injuries from suspected physical abuse" (page 3). For example, typical locations for injuries from physical abuse are "the back surfaces of a child's body from the neck to the knees, injuries to the face. Injuries to the shins, elbows, knees or forehead are nor typical injuries from sustained abuse" (same page). Though this list is not comprehensive, here are some types of injuries that could be suspect when they present themselves: bruises, abrasions, complaints of internal injuries, burns, lacerations, fractures/pain, bite marks, head injuries. Now, these are physical indicators and some try to debate over "sparing the rod", but it should also be clear that we are not to put out a smoldering wick or hinder a young person from coming to Jesus. Next time, we will couple these indicators with some possible behavioral factors with the goal of protecting the vulnerable amongst us.
